THE RECTOR WRITES...



I write this month's column a few days before the Feast of Saint Michael and All Angels, commonly called *Michaelmas*, which is ordinarily observed on September 29th, but which this year will be translated to the 30th, as the feast is not of a high enough order to take precedence of a Sunday, even during ordinary time. (If you're curious, only a handful of feasts take precedence of a Sunday, and you can find them listed on pages 15 and 16 of the *Book of Common Prayer*.) Though we will celebrate a Eucharist for this major feast at 7:15 on the morning of Monday the 30th, I think it's a shame we don't get to properly observe the holiday on Sunday. I did sneak in a hymn for this Sunday by the moderate 17th Century Puritan John Baxter, "Ye Holy Angels Bright," so the day doesn't go entirely unacknowledged.

I think it's a shame we can't celebrate Michaelmas on a Sunday because we modern, 21st Century people often shrink from discussing things like spiritual beings and forces and I think we need to have that conversation. I remember reading an interview with one of the founders of radical orthodoxy (an intellectual movement within the Church of England with which I share a great number of theological commitments), John Milbank, some years ago lamenting that a planned conversation among diocesan clergy somewhere in England had to be scrapped. It was because this conversation was to focus on the angelic and demonic, and no clergy could be found in that diocese who believed in such things. He proceeded to make the bold, impolitic claim that nobody should be ordained an Anglican priest unless she or he could give at least some account along these lines. Though this might be hugely unpopular, I must admit that I'm generally in agreement with Milbank here.

My contention is that angels and demons are not mere metaphors. They are, rather, spiritual beings with intelligence and will. It strikes me as more than peculiar that we can embrace the existence of a non-corporeal God, pure spirit and perfect in power and glory and will, but we are timid about affirming the existence of any other spiritual beings. Perhaps it is because we don't really believe that God is a personal God - that God really is a being of pure spirit - and instead really believe that God is simply some sort of organizing principle or "Ground of Being." I doubt this is the case for most ordinary believers, but I have no doubt that this is part of the modernist theological agenda, which is now, I believe, going out of fashion (though, in my opinion, not quickly enough.)

More likely, I think, is that the ordinary believer in the contemporary Church has been discouraged, perhaps unintentionally, from thinking overmuch about the spiritual realm due to a lack of emphasis by us clergy or else they have become embarrassed to discuss such matters due to a perceived overemphasis by those Christians whom we might deem less sophisticated or even see as superstitious. This latter possibility is not something to

be applauded, but rather disowned as a function of pride. It is especially problematic if this assumption extends to the biblical material itself. The ideological context of those who wrote the Bible over the course of eight or nine centuries is important, but we make a mistake if we immediately assume these writers, whom we insist were to some degree *inspired*, were simply superstitious or unintelligent.

But why does this matter? For one thing it matters simply because the biblical witness seems so clearly and unequivocally to confirm that there are indeed spiritual forces and persons which seek to help or hinder our relationship with God in Christ. No doubt vain theories and superstitions have abounded around these issues over the course of two millennia, but overreacting by ignoring this theme in scripture and church tradition seems to me to be a perfect example of "throwing the baby out with the bathwater."

Even more importantly, in failing to take this matter seriously we run the risk of missing the aid offered by the heavenly host or the danger posed by the forces of wickedness. Often mistakenly attributed to C.S. Lewis, though in fact a quote of Baudelaire, rings true no matter who said it: "The greatest trick the devil ever pulled was convincing the world he didn't exist." How much divine help might we receive if we weren't prepared to receive the help of those whom Monday's collect tells us God "ordained and constituted in a wonderful order" to "help and defend us here on earth?" How great it is to remember that it is these same angels who will ultimately, we are told, lead us into paradise and who continue to rejoice at one lost sinner being saved. Just as the Saints intercede for us before the throne of God, so do the angels help us worship the same divine Lord. Thanks be to God that we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses.

MUSIC NOTES

Why We Sing the Psalms

When we think of the Psalms, most of us think solely of reading them. But we should also sing them, particularly in the gathering of the church, as we do at Trinity. Indeed, for 3,000 years the Psalter has been the songbook of God's people. They have been an integral part of Jewish worship and early Christian worship, and have remained a part of the Christian Church right up until modern times. As a boy, Jesus would have memorized and learned many if not all of the Psalms. The book of Psalms is the songbook of the Bible. They would become the soundtrack of his life, as they are for so many of us today.

The Psalms give us the full breadth of God's character: his glory, eternity, wrath and judgment, mystery, comfort, love, and forgiveness. When we come together as a worshipping community, nothing unites us or strengthens us more than song. Singing the psalms together, rather than just speaking them, inspires us to the joy of praising Him in Psalm 150 or seeking His comfort in Psalm 23. Singing the Psalms together helps us memorize the words to take with us in our hearts. Singing the Psalms together draws us together as a body of Christ, brothers and sisters, one in His love, strengthened and encouraged in our faith.

The three forms of psalm-singing are metrical-psalm singing (the music is rhythmic, like a hymn); plainchant (medieval, unaccompanied, without meter); and English or Anglican chant (unmetered, words of the psalm are set to 4-part harmony, usually sung by the Choir, in speech cadence). Anglican chant started in the 16th century and is very popular in Episcopal churches. This is what we sing mostly at Trinity. It is a long-standing part of the Anglican churches that have a strong choral liturgical tradition.

I hope you will join in our psalm-singing with gusto!

And let me issue another invitation to join us in the choir. We particularly need sopranos this year. Kathy Creighton has moved to Florida, and we need extra voices!!

Capital Campaign Projects Update

THE KITCHEN RENOVATION

This project will start in mid-October, take an estimated six weeks to complete, and be finished by the Advent season. The parish members had a selection day and chose a blue-based décor for paint, counter-tops, back-splash, and flooring.

Due to the construction, the kitchen will be out of use for approximately six weeks. This means that we will need to get creative about how to do coffee hours and parish breakfasts. If you have already volunteered for a coffee hour during this time, someone will be calling you about it soon.
