THE RECTOR WRITES



And because this of all things would rejoice his heart, let us at this time remember in his name the poor and the helpless, the cold and the hungry, the abused, the exploited and the oppressed; the sick in body and in mind, and them that mourn; the isolated, the lonely, and the unloved; the elderly and the little children; all who know not the Lord Jesus, or who love him not, or who by sin have grieved his heart of love.

Dear ones,

The words above, taken from the opening address of the Christmas Festival of Lessons and Carols, struck me as particularly apt this year. Every year in the lead-up to Christmas I am struck again by the generosity of our people. Our knitting guild and others who contribute to our Christmas at Sea ministry, those who give money to buy Christmas gifts for our Cancer Patient Services families, and those who provide warm clothing for our Mitten Tree always go above-and-beyond.

Another ministry which came together rather quickly—you might say "during the eleventh hour"—was opening up our parish hall as Findlay's warming center to those who needed shelter from the extreme cold during the two days immediately prior to Christmas. Volunteers from the parish and the larger community, assistance from the city mission, and Karen Eubanks' yeoman's work in getting it organized meant that seventeen individuals were kept safe and relatively warm amidst some very dangerous conditions. We had a meeting with the director of the City Mission about a week later to debrief, and she said something which I might have considered in the back of my mind, but which had not really become "real" to me until I heard somebody else say it: "Your church literally saved lives."

One thing of which I'm constantly aware is the fact that for us, as Christians, we do not do these things out of a secular ethic of "supporting human flourishing." This isn't to say that those who give of themselves to this end are not to be commended. However, to use some fancy philosophical jargon, a utilitarian or otherwise *consequentalist* approach to ethics is, for us, too prone to compromising principles and to the possibility of "moral luck" to be satisfying.

Neither do we do these things because we think we're earning our way into heaven by being good. That approach misses the point of Christ's sacrifice and salvation by grace through faith. This may not seem like a "big deal" so long as we're doing all the right things, but experience shows that we'll never be able to keep it up. Our inclination to sin is too strong for us to become perfect in this life, and if that were required, heaven would be a rather lonely place, indeed.

No, we do these things because it rejoices Christ's heart of love. We do them because we might get a fleeting glimpse of the Kingdom which only he, our Lord, can bring about. We do them because it's good for our souls, whether or not there are any temporal or eternal consequences of simply doing the right thing.

So, once again, I am grateful to all of you for giving our community and world a good example of Christian love. Perhaps it will bear fruit by encouraging others to do the same; perhaps it won't, but that's okay, because we're not charged with solving all the world's problems. We are, rather, charged with the obligation to be a light, however humble, illuming the love of God for all those whom He created. Thank you for being those lights, and do keep it up!

The Altar Guild is welcoming new members. If you have been thinking about getting more involved at Trinity in a way that serves the church and all of its members, it's time to take a look at the Aggies.

Members of the St. Agnes Altar Guild care for the altar linens, set-up for communion and cleanup afterward, polish the silver and brass, change the hanging colors as needed, and

make sure everything is ready for Sunday morning. Wow! Sounds like a lot – but it actually doesn't take a lot of time to participate.

Members are usually scheduled one or two times per month, depending on the number of Altar Guild members. When you join, you'll be teamed with a current member for several months to learn what you need to by working side-by-side with that member on setting-up and clearing. Altar Guild members are always ready to help each other.

What does the Altar Guild do?

- Set-up for Sunday services on Friday or Saturday
- On Sundays at 9:30, clear from the 8:30 service and reset for the 10:00 service
- Candles are refilled and the small linens from the service are washed
- Two all-member cleaning mornings get the sanctuary ready for Easter and Christmas


