THE RECTOR WRITES



There is a cliché one may have seen this year and previous years around the first of January in advertisements and self-help circles and the like: "New Year, New Me." This turn of phrase has always made me a bit uncomfortable, as it seems to place an inordinate amount of faith in human capacity for improvement. I much prefer the sentiment expressed by a friend of mine online: "New Year, Same Me, Same God." This strikes me as a more reasonable, humble approach to personal progress, whether in the spiritual realm or otherwise. Whatever improvements we make, if they are of any significance, are surely not accomplished under our own steam but thanks to the grace we are given as God who can work in us more than we could possibly ask or imagine (Ephesians 3:20).

That said, I'm a bit ambivalent about New Year's resolutions, and not just because it always makes securing my preferred elliptical machine at the gym a less certain proposition for a few weeks each January. To be honest, I feel similarly about Lenten disciplines, though I'm certainly more faithful about making an effort at maintaining those. They are related in my mind because I think both may serve their most important function when we fail at them. I am often reminded of one of the petitions in "A General Thanksgiving": "We thank you also for those disappointments and failures that lead us to acknowledge our dependence on you alone." (BCP, 836) The Gospel gives us freedom to fail - something which each of us will do sooner or later, and which I do all the time! - knowing that the most important thing is not our own success but Christ's perfection being imputed to us.

None of this should suggest that our efforts are entirely in vain. I'm not certain that true sanctification is possible except through suffering - this it seems to me is the message we hear in the beatitudes and that we see over and over again in the lives of the Saints. Even so, spiritual progress, halting though it may be, is possible to a degree in this life. I was pleasantly surprised by a message on a church sign I saw recently: "This year, aim for progress, not perfection." I was surprised because this was displayed at a Methodist Church, and the one thing which distinguishes classical Methodism, is the (to my mind utterly incorrect) belief that spiritual perfection in this life is possible. Much as one may lament any church body's loss of its distinctive attributes and moves toward "lowest common denominator" theology, jettisoning the rather inhumane and empirically falsified claim that we can be perfect is largely a good move as far as I'm concerned.

So, my prayer for you and for myself in this new year is two-fold. First, I pray that you and I can become a little more faithful in all those things that nurture the spiritual and moral virtues in our souls - in prayer and study and acts of kindness and generosity and all the rest. Second, I pray that when we fail - and we will - that we will come to rely even more fully on God's total love and acceptance of us, undeserving though we are.

CHRIST IN A STRANGER'S GUISE


For you never know when you might meet...

...Christ in a stranger's guise.



Welcome to January! The Trinity library has some great books for learning, affirming, or exploring. If the snow starts to fall, the temperatures drop, and you're looking for a good book, stop in to browse the collection. Borrowing books is free and there is no set return date for borrowed books. The library is located in the parlor.

To catch your interest, here is a short passage from this month's featured book: <u>Living in the Spirit</u> by Rachel Hosmer and Alan Jones, part of The Church's Teaching Series.

The Christian's Call to Prayer

"What Christ accomplished on the cross, once and for all, in a particular place at a particular time, is now the source of all our being and doing. The Christian's call to discipleship in prayer is a call to share in the whole life of the Lord, in his dying and in his rising. We are not only to bear our Cross, but, strangely, to bear also the Resurrection. In the Gospels the accounts of the calls of the disciples resemble the Old Testament accounts of the calls of the prophets. We are called in this manner, too. We read accounts of individual experiences summoning a person to leave familiar tasks and well-trod paths behind, and to explore new ways, ways that involve risk and call for strength far beyond their powers. The response to the call itself is an experience of transformation. Christians are called to take up the cross and follow. As we hear this word in faith and open ourselves to receive the gift hidden in the call, we are taken up into life on a different level, the level of what the New Testament calls the Kingdom. The life of prayer is largely a waiting in patience for the call, a quiet and intense listening for the creative word that proclaims the reign of God. (p 25)"

Dr. Marie Louden-Hanes is a painter, art historian, ordained pastor, and recent author. In her own paintings, she manipulates form and color and plays the resulting imagery against the shifting and seasonal patterns of light and dark as defined by the natural environment.
