THE RECTOR WRITES



I try to be careful not to pass off ideas as my own when they come from somebody else, even in conversations when I cannot remember to whom said idea should be attributed. Sometimes I slip up, though, my bookcases and my mind being untidily stuffed with texts and ideas! Such is the case with one of my favorite aphorisms: "Original Sin is the one doctrine of Christianity which can be and has been empirically proved." Annie reminded me after I tried to claim this aphorism for my own that this idea was actually clearly stated by none other than G.K. Chesterton in Orthodoxy – a book which I have read more than once, though not for at least a decade. He put it this way:

Modern masters of science are much impressed with the need of beginning all inquiry with a fact. The ancient masters of religion were quite equally impressed with that necessity. They began with the fact of sin – a fact as practical as potatoes. But certain religious leaders in London, not mere materialists, have begun in our day not to deny the highly disputable water, but to deny the indisputable dirt. Certain new theologians dispute original sin which is the only part of Christian theology which can really be proved. (Chesterton, 1909, pg. 24)

My apologies to the great "Prince of Paradox", as Chesterton was known, for trying to take credit for his idea! I've heard arguments against this view, though none of them compelling. Generally such arguments seem to me based around what people now call "vibes" rather than experience and reason. "I believe in original blessing rather than original sin" seems much less gloomy, though I do not see how one could look at the state of our fallen world and make this argument with a straight face. More importantly, though, such an approach is (perhaps counter-intuitively) wildly inhumane. The implication is that when one errs and strays from God's way like a lost sheep, the problem is not a fault in human nature but in that one individual, who'd be perfect if he or she just tried harder. Perhaps this would appeal to somebody who never slips up, but I've yet to meet such a person. Or I should say I've only met one such person, whom I've met in prayer and Sacrament as if face to face, but none of us is Him!

Some of you know that while I insist that our public church services adhere to the standards of the Episcopal Church's current practices in a rather "middle of the road" way for both canonical and principled reasons – in the latter case, because even when the rubrics allow for some variation, I generally don't want parishioners to be hit over the head with too many of my pedantic and nit-picky liturgical preferences - in my own personal and domestic prayer life I tend toward older forms. As W.H. Auden famously wrote to his Rector during the experimental phase of the last prayer book revision, in my own life I tend to stick to "Cranmer and King James" (i.e., older editions of the Book of Common Prayer and the Coverdale Psalter, along with lessons from the Authorized Version of the Bible).

I bring all that up because there is one clause in the general confession in these older prayer books that I really do wish had not been excised when we moved from the 1928 edition to that of 1979 which I take great, completely unironic comfort in saying in my own prayers: "And there is no health in us." I understand why they took it out; it sounds harsh. Even so, it reminds me that sin is not just a list of naughty things I do sometimes and need to stop doing. Rather it is a condition, in some ways like a medical condition, which God can treat palliatively in me, but which is only healed at the Resurrection. As the Rev'd Sam Ashton pithily put it in a blog post from the Latimer Trust (an evangelical Anglican think-tank), "I'm not a sinner because I sin; I sin because I'm a sinner."

As we approach Lent once again, we would do well to recognize both our need for healing and the promise of forgiveness which is ever near at hand. Believe it or not, we can find great joy in the midst of penitence, because it means that we do not have to be perfect this side of Paradise, that God understands and accepts us anyway. When we are mindful of this reality we can as we approach the festival of Easter "enter into the joy of our Lord," as St. John Chrysostom put it, to celebrate the victory of our Lord and God with all the more zeal and delight.

Remember to SPRING AHEAD one hour! Daylight Savings time begins March 9th.




2025 Kalendars are now available in the parish hall. \$7 each with the proceeds going to the Altar Guild.

Easter will be here on Sunday, April 20th. Altar Guild is seeking someone to design and make our window decorations for Easter. The window decorations will go up on Saturday, April 19th, and stay up for several

We're coming into one of Altar Guild's busy times during the church year - Wednesday, March 5th we'll be 'going purple' for Ash Wednesday through Lent until Palm Sunday.

If you've thought about looking into some new ways to get involved at Trinity, check out the Altar Guild! Every month members are assigned to a week when they are responsible for doing the Communion set-up before Sunday and then taking care of the communion set-ups and clears for the 8:30 and 10 a.m. services on that Sunday. If you'd like to see what's involved, just stop in at the Sacristy (the little room on the left at the front of the sanctuary, also accessible through the parlor) on a Sunday at 9:30 or after the 10:00 service. Whichever Altar Guild member is serving that day will be happy to show you what we do.
